


EPISODE 17:THE FURNITURE

"The altar on which the sacrifice is made has become a type of the Lord Jesus. Just as the altar has brought the offering to God, so Christ has offered Himself to God. This gave value to His offering. This wonderful Person presented it... The altar is more than the offering, for the altar sanctifies the sacrifices. Christ is everything, altar and sacrifice. He is also the priest who causes the sacrifice to ascend to God in the flames. He offered up Himself... The Son gave Himself for

us, but in the first place He gave Himself to God, who had been dishonoured by sin, and now it was His desire to glorify God."

"The wood and copper with which it was built indicated the two essentials required of Him before He could make an atonement for sin. First, He must have blood to shed, because God has said that 'without shedding of blood is no remission'... Second, He must be equal with God the Father, in order to be able to meet the demands of the throne of God in its judgment upon sin. Copper can endure great heat, which suggests Christ's ability to endure the fierce wrath of a thrice holy God against sin."

The fire, long burning on the Altar, consuming to ashes their sacrifices, very plainly told this; it showed what God's estimate of sin was, and how death was the only way in which its doom could come."

"There is no approach to God except by the Cross of the Lord Jesus Christ, and by faith in His death and substitutionary sacrifice. The Israelite might bring the most beautiful, perfect, lovely, spotless lamb to the priest, but unless it was killed and offered as a sacrifice in the place of the sinner, it availed absolutely nothing at all. We too may extol the perfections of the Lord Jesus Christ, admire His sinless beauty, sing of His virtues, magnify His graciousness, and laud Him as a perfect example and a noble martyr to a noble cause, but it will not do without His death, and personal faith in His shed blood. The death of the Lord Jesus Christ on the Cross, therefore, not His life, is our only hope of salvation. The Cross stands squarely between the sinner and God."
