

Lies My Parents Told Me

emember when dads went to work and moms kept the home? Families had problems, but they stayed families. There was one divorced woman in our neighborhood then, and she pretty well wore a scarlet letter.

But things began to change. People stopped believing in "doing your duty." Life was for enjoyment, we were told, and that didn't include the humdrum of housework, child rearing, or making the big effort to keep marriages together. If you didn't enjoy it, let it go!

And let it go they did. At a recent school reunion there, the chairman asked how many of the alumni were married. How many divorced? The second group was as large, if not larger.

Now my parents were old-fashioned. My mom actually enjoyed being a homemaker—or so she said. My dad took his responsibilities seriously as a father, and actually enjoyed it—or so he said. But how could you trust your parents when they told you lies like these:

Lie Number 1: It's better to do without two late-model cars, designer clothes, a timeshare in Florida, Corian countertops, and a purebred dog, than for both parents to work outside the home. Can you believe they expected us kids to believe that? How are you supposed to hold your head up if you don't have a polo player on your shirt? Can life have any meaning if you can't afford to have your blue jeans dry-cleaned?

Lie Number 2: If a couple has children, they are responsible to raise them. I mean, really! Were my parents suggesting that the idea of mothers (without professional training as child caregivers) looking after their own offspring in their own homes, was better than putting their toddlers in the care of qualified strangers at the local day-care center? How could we believe such a thing when the experts were telling us repeatedly that a woman had needs that could only be met in the workplace. And besides, there was no place where children could be nurtured in their formative years like day-care heaven!

Lie Number 3: If, in some extreme cases, both parents did have to work, or in a single-parent home, arrangements could still be made to raise

the children without farming them out to strangers. Can you believe it? Of course, my parents didn't have available the years of research and case studies that have proven how fulfilling and liberating it is not to raise your own children. The parents' responsibility is to equip their little offspring with the skills necessary to act like adults as soon as possible (how to handle alarm systems, how to operate video machines, how to cook supper in the microwave). Why? So the parents can continue to act like kids! Minimum responsibility; maximum fun!

Of course, my parents weren't telling me lies, even though society at large said they were. And a recent issue of *U.S. News & World Report* exposes what the real lies are. In an article entitled, "Lies Parents Tell Themselves About Why They Work," authors Shannon Brownlee and Matthew Miller cite some helpful data.

Are two incomes a must for life's necessities? Depends on how you define necessities: "When asked in a 1975 survey to define 'the good life,' a majority listed only a handful of things: a car, a lawn, a home they owned; a happy marriage; an interesting job; and being able to afford college for the kids. Twenty years later, the Roper Starch Worldwide survey found that most respondents defined 'the good life' to mean far more in material terms: a job that pays 'much more than average,' 'a lot of money,' a color TV. Four in ten add 'really nice clothes,' a second car, a vacation home, travel abroad...." In most cases, the second salary adds little to the family income. It goes to cover day-care, commuting, meals out, dry cleaning, a work wardrobe, and taxes.

What about day-care? A recent study shows "15 percent of day-care facilities were excellent, 70 percent were 'barely adequate,' and 15 percent were abysmal." And even those in the facilities rated excellent may be in danger of emotional damage. Initial findings from a \$45 million study by the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development are telling us what my parents knew years ago: When God designed the family, He knew what He was doing.

And that's no lie.

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ZAIRE UPDATE

In an April visit to Zaire (again called Congo by Kabila's liberation army), I visited the AIM station of Rethy (where the school for missionary children has been for over 60 years), the town of Bunia, and our assembly stations of Nyankunde, Lolwa and Aveba. Everywhere vehicles were taken, and those intentionally disabled by missionaries were destroyed.

Rethy has been so badly torn up by Mobutu's retreating soldiers and local looters that it is difficult to envisage the school's reopening in the foreseeable future. Bunia shows but a shadow of its former bustling commerce.

Nyankunde, comprised of six houses, school rooms, and two hangars, was pillaged and grass-roofed homes burned. Maryen Baisley crouched in her bedroom as bullets clattered off her roof during the battle for Nyankunde in December, and later, with the help of several faithful young men, courageously hid a vehicle, motorcycles, and missionaries' goods, saving them from loss.

At Lolwa, seven truckloads of goods were removed by soldiers from the missionary homes, hospital, and nurses' training school.

Some stations escaped the devastation. Tchabi lost only a truck, Aveba's dispensary was looted, and Itendey lost a car and fuel.

The liberated part of the country is peaceful, but there are signs of potential problems that cause both Zairian and missionary leaders to urge those who wish to return to wait patiently until a new government is functioning.

ver the past few years, the Lord has laid a burden on the hearts of a few saints in Southern Florida to reach out into our neighborhoods with the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. By the Lord's grace, the Southern Gospel Team has developed as a result.

The burden came about as two brethren were in Key West ministering God's Word to the saints there. The small assembly is located in downtown Key West and has a wonderful set-up with a cottage in the backyard. Both brothers have been involved extensively in gospel efforts and, as the idea grew, they decided to discuss it with their four-family Bible study group.

The group began to pray about the possibility and to watch to see if the Lord would open the doors for such an effort. When the idea was mentioned to the saints in Key West, they excitedly gave us the green light.

The primary goal of the Southern Gospel Team is to work with local assemblies around South Florida to arrange special outreach programs which include house visits, distribution of tracts, distribution of portions of God's Word, gospel meetings, and other activities. This will help established assemblies grow with new Christians. We also seek to go into areas where there is presently no assembly work and (Lord willing) see souls saved and eventually new local churches planted.

The secondary purpose is to encourage believers to regain the vision of reaching out to the lost and to be obedient to our Lord's commission to go. We desire to provide an avenue of opportunity for anyone who is interested in learning through practical on-the-job training, and to bring together various individuals who are already involved in the work of evangelism so that we might learn from them as well.

One of our commitments is to have no age limit as to who can be a part of the team. Our children have

walked the streets, handed out tracts, sung songs in the open air, and knocked on doors side by side with us. We desire to diligently teach our children the ways of the Lord. We also welcome "the grayer set" and are thrilled to see the two laboring side by side in the service for the Lord. High schoolers, college students, and full-time workers are also welcome.

Over the past two years, the Lord has enabled the Southern Gospel Team to undertake outreaches in Key West, St. Petersburg, Pembroke Pines, and on the beaches of Hollywood, FL. Some efforts were done with the co-operation of the assembly in that area and all were encouraged with the results.

The two outreaches in October 1995 and 1996 in Key West as well as the effort in St. Petersburg have proven to be an encouragement to the team and the local Christians. Each time, unbelievers have attended the meetings and some have professed salvation. In St. Petersburg, every home within one square mile of the assembly received a flyer and people are still coming to the meetings as a result of that campaign.


David Dunlap provided training materials which were used for about an hour each day. The team went out twice a day, but always began with at least 30 minutes of prayer. The days would end with much praise to the Lord and prayer on behalf of all those that were contacted. As often happens when saints join together, many new ideas have been generated which will be used in future campaigns, Lord willing.

MARTYRS IN OUR DAY

On the morning of April 21, Mansour Hussein was killed by a shot in the head in a Christian bookshop in Arbil, Iraqi Kurdistan. He was discovered by a co-worker on his arrival in the bookshop.

Mansour was an evangelical believer, a Kurd from a Muslim background. He was bold and fearless in the witness of his faith. Fellow Christians in Arbil say that there is little doubt that he died as a martyr, testifying to the truth that is in Christ Jesus. Mr. Hussein leaves a wife and an 18-month-old son.

Christians in Arbil are issuing an urgent plea to the Body of Christ around the world for special prayer. Pray for Mansour's wife, son, and the co-worker who discovered his body. Pray for other believers in Arbil that they might stand firm in their faith. They are specifically seeking spiritual support before the Lord God that the shedding of the blood of Mansour will become the seed of the church in Arbil.

→ WORLD HINDU COUNCIL OPPOSES MISSIONARIES

A militant Hindu group has vowed to oppose attempts by Christian and Islamic missionaries to convert Hindus, the Press Trust of India reported.

Ashok Singhal of the Vishwa Hindu Parishad (VHP, World Hindu Council) said in the city of Sagar that his group would raise an army of about 10,000 Hindus "to counter the conversions of Hindus."

"Christian and Islamic missionaries are responsible for conversion of more than 800,000 poor Hindus" into their religions, he was quoted as saying. Singhal did not say how the

Hindu army would go about opposing future conversions.

The VHP was blamed for the December 1992 razing of the 16th century Babri mosque in Ayodya that led to bloody Hindu-Muslim clashes across the country.

⊃ FALSELY ACCUSED

A missionary in Guatemala remains in prison after a month of investigation. Eugene Nij (neeh), known as "Queno," and his family, have served in San Raymundo for over a decade as part of the New Iberian Mission. They have built an orphanage, a free school, and a number of churches to preach the gospel.

Queno was arrested on what the mission calls false murder charges.

Early in April, two ladies tried to kidnap a baby in the town square (kidnapping is common and out of control). Some merchants heard the mother's screams and went to her rescue. They caught the women and got the baby back-but not before the square filled with a mob of angry ladies who would have killed the kidnappers. Queno heard the news and frantically hurried to stop the riot. The police were already on the scene trying to decide what to do. Queno asked to speak to the women and was able to calm them down. Before leaving to go back across town to finish the school day, he warned the police to send the kidnappers to a jail in another town for their own protection.

The police did not heed Queno's advice and that night, when the men came in from the fields, the women incited them to tear down the jail and kill the women. One woman was killed and another seriously injured.

The corrupt police are holding

Queno responsible for the murder.

That accusation is playing itself out in court. As reports indicate, the judge and prosecutor in the case allegedly broke eight federal laws when they searched for evidence. Another judge and prosecutor will now be appointed to the case. Family members are hoping this will bring about his release soon. Pray for Eugene Nij and his family.

THE BEAR AND DRAGON

Signaling a new closeness after decades of suspicion, Russia and China signed a joint declaration that, according to Russian President Boris Yeltsin, will help define "a new international order." The agreement between the world's two largest countries endorses a "multipolar world," a concept aimed at limiting U. S. power and influence. —World

> FAITHFUL IN ROMANIA

In Romania, evangelical church members aren't giving up despite recent persecution there. Door of Hope International's Paul Popov says more than 700 Orthodox Christians allegedly attacked members of an evangelical church who were renting a hall in northeast Romania. Popov says this violence won't stop their efforts to build a youth training center. "The beating will encourage us that we must do it as soon as possible. And that, when we have summer camps and youth camps for the young people during the summer, we invite Orthodox as well as Protestant children." Popov says the violence won't stop evangelicals from worshipping, either. If the Communists couldn't put fear in their heart, the Orthodox mob is not going to be able to do it, he said. u

The Parent as Intercessor

We remember Job for his problems, his pain, and his patience. But he ought to be remembered as well for his prayers.

nd it was so, when the days of their feasting were gone about, that Job sent and sanctified them, and rose up early in the morning, and offered burnt offerings according to the number of them all: for Job said, It may be that my sons have sinned, and cursed God in their hearts. Thus did Job continually. Job 1:5

What a beautiful picture of a man in whose heart the fear of God lives! Job feared lest his children sin against God or forsake Him in their hearts. He was so deeply conscious of the weakness of human nature that, even when he did not know of any particular sin in their lives, the very thought of their having been in circumstances of temptation made him afraid. He so fully realized his position and privilege as parent that he took upon himself the continual offering of the needed sacrifice.

The book of Job might have been complete without this illustration, as far as the record of Job's patience

and faith is concerned, but we would have missed the much needed lesson that a parent's consecration to God includes the home life, too.

Let us study the lesson his example teaches.

A deep fear of overlooking sin in himself or his children is one of the marks of a wise Christian.

How superficial our views of sin often are! And how easily we are satisfied! Under the appearance of what is good and loving, sin may be hidden. Our children may be growing up renouncing God in their hearts! Let parents ask God to give them a right sense of what sin is in their children—its curse, its dishonor to God, its power.

Every thoughtful parent knows there are times and places when his child may be more influenced to yield to temptation. A praying parent should do what Job did when he sent for his sons; he prayed for them.

Intercessory prayer is a secret of parental power and blessing. Parents need to pray earnestly that God will enlighten their hearts to prevail in prayer for their children. In our family life, the first consideration should not be our personal happiness or the care of providing all the daily needs but the yielding of ourselves, as ministers of His grace to God's eternal purpose: the deliverance of our children from sin. And our family life shall evermore be lightened up with God's own presence and with the joy of the heavenly home.

I can hardly think of anyone in the Bible who exemplifies the healthy balance between personal conviction and public expression more than Noah. He exhibits the same balance between his calling as a father and his calling as a preacher—and remains an appropriate model even today.

The text in Hebrews 11:7 spells out every pertinent detail that we need to know of this man. I want to consider him as an exemplary father for all of us. And even if we are not fathers, it would still be good for us as Christians.

THIS FATHER AND HIS FAITH

"By faith Noah, being warned of God of things not seen as yet..."

Here was a man who believed God, even in the matter of rain. What was so significant here, of course, is that there had never been any rain before. Not only did he trust God for what he couldn't see, he had to trust God for what had never been seen by anyone.

His faith was more than some issue over raindrops. God called for a boat to be built in a certain way, within a certain period of time. His faith has been described as a *true* faith (he lived up to what God told him), an *active* faith (he carried out a task for God) and a *consistent* faith (he did this over a 120-year period).

We need fathers like Noah today. Our world is as wicked and perverse (Gen. 6:5), as well as corrupt and violent (Gen. 6:11), as Noah's was. If there is anything that should mark us as leaders in our homes, it is faith.

THE FATHER AND HIS FEARS

"Moved with fear ... "

These three words pack a wealth of meaning. It wasn't a matter of being frightened: it was a matter of being marked with "reverential care" (Kenneth Wuest). As a man of faith, Noah was able to focus on the future and focus up above—and it didn't look good. He knew that judgment was coming, and that he had better do something about it.

We have seen his active faith; now we have his ac-

We sometimes imagine that the patriarchs had it easy. Country living. Pastoral scenery. No problems but wayward sheep. Oh, really? Noah's generation was so wicked God had to destroy it completely.

tive fears. He was "moved," that is to say, he did something about it. We all have fears as fathers. We have fears from some things and we fear for some things. There is, if you will, a cause and effect in fear. We may fear the world around us, or the world in our home. We may fear the trends in the churches around us, or perhaps something right in our own assembly. These are causes. And the effects are on our children. But remember, it is a godly fear, a holy concern, that is the issue here. Noah teaches us that we should have a divine concern ("fear") about something, followed by a divine conviction ("moved"). It is one thing to have some sort of upset over some issue, but it is entirely another matter to actually do something about it.

THE FATHER AND HIS FAMILY

"Prepared an ark to the saving of his family"

Noah combined a busy ministry life with his family life—a rare feat indeed. Ministry and family are often placed in one of three categories: Ministry or Family; Ministry vs. Family; or Ministry and Family. In other words, a contrast, a conflict, or a compliment. Noah chose the latter, and so can we.

His ministry model ("prepared an ark") was matched by his family model ("to the saving of his family"). Noah's efforts had a direct impact on his family. As he served, he also saved. My understanding is that they built the ark together. I would call that an active family. Do we have any so-called arks that we could build together as a family? This could involve singing together, visiting together, or cooking together; it could mean hospitality, outreach, or campwork.

THE FATHER AND HIS FUTURE

("By the which he condemned the world and became heir of the righteousness which is by faith.")

The world and eternity are contrasted here. His future lay beyond the raindrops and the ark: he was just

passing through, and his future was in the "things which are above" (Col. 3:1). He was in the world, to be sure, but he wasn't of the world. In fact, it seems that the text teaches us that his behavior was a real offense to the world around him.

Fathers, do we condemn the world by our actions? If we link the phrase "by the which" with the previous statement, it appears that the condemnation was in how he was raising his family. Do our child-rearing practices condemn the world? Does our family life bring shame upon the world? Or perhaps it shames the Lord!

There is a future here, but it is not our future. We

are training our children to serve in the next generation. Are we working at it? It doesn't just happen. It is a combination of everything that we have stated thus

- 1. We must have leaders in our homes who live by faith.
- 2. We must have leaders in our homes who possess godly convictions.
- 3. We must have leaders in our homes who know the blend of ministry life and family life.

God help us to follow the Noahic pattern of godly fatherhood in the days to come.

4. Choosing a Vocation in the Will of God-HAROLD SUMMERS

What jobs make the best use of the abilities the Lord has given you? How will your vocation affect your future: for marriage and family, assembly participation, and perhaps full-time Christian ministry? In this seminar you will look at scriptural principles to guide you to that right vocation. (YTS)

HAROLD has been active in the Lord's work in the Vancouver area for many years, serving in oversight, preaching, youth work, and home Bible studies. He worked in government and the forest products industry prior to entering the real estate business.

14. Let No Man Despise Thy Youth-JOE MIKHAEL

What has the Lord called me to do? We have the privilege of being co-workers together with God. Using biblical examples, with special emphasis on young people, we will find that God has a unique plan for you as a young person in His great work. (YTS)

Joe has recently completed medical school (U. of Ottawa), and is now pursuing specialty training. He has the opportunity of travelling in North America to preach the Word. He has a particular interest in young people, speaking at youth rallies and retreats.

15. Fellowship in the Local Church: What Is It?-Doug KAZEN

The local church is a functional body of saints knit together by the Spirit. A body must function as a unit to achieve its healthy purposes. The foundation of local church fellowship is doctrinal purity. The contrived "unity" based on ecumenism is not fellowship. Also, a body knows which are its component parts. Permissiveness that tolerates fuzzy uncertainty as to who is in or out of fellowship, is not scriptural. Other practical issues to be discussed.

DOUG is founder/owner of a medical and dental products manufacturing firm in Woodinville, WA. With more than 30 years in business, Doug has had ample opportunity to see the needs of people worldwide. An elder for more than 25 years, he travels extensively in a speaking and conference ministry.

16. Let the Older Women Teach the Younger—RUTH STEIFLER

Some women of Scripture show us what God wants a godly woman to be. We are always examples, but what are we teaching by our example? How much do we care about younger women? Areas of teaching: home life, Sunday School or children's clubs, camp counseling, women's Bible studies, hospitality, outreach, etc. A very needed ministry today! (WOS)

RUTH was brought up in PA. After nursing, and visiting mission fields, she worked at CMML and camp until marriage. She travels with her husband, directs Greenwood Hills Girls' Camp, and other camp work. They have a hospitality ministry at home.

17. An Effective College & Careers Program—DAVID BROADHEAD

Is it possible to have a successful college and careers group in your assembly? Yes! This seminar will show you one method that 3 couples used to grow a group from elementary school to college age. Subjects include: assessing the need, finding helpers, using discipleship, and reaching out to unbelievers. Not much theory—rather a simple outline you can implement with your assembly.

DAVID BROADHEAD serves the Lord at Salem Acres in central Alberta. With his wife, Ruby, and children Cameron and Melanie, he is involved in youth work, camps, and teaching. He is strongly committed to the value of personal discipling.

18. Ethical Decisions in a Relativistic World—PANEL

How does a Christian deal with issues such as homosexuality, divorce, assisted suicide, abortion, gambling, and soon, cloning? Living in a world of relative truth, we have the absolute truth of God's Word. This panel of men with medical, legal, and academic backgrounds will address these and other issues. You will discover the *biblical principles* which lead us to right decisions.

JON REIMER, chairman, is a Family Physician in Augusta, GA, and elder at Believers' Gospel Chapel. He is married with two teenage sons and active on the school and camp boards.

JOE MIKHAEL has recently completed medical school, and is now pursuing specialty training. He also travels in Canada and the US to minister the Word and preach the gospel.

22. A Short & Sweet History of "the Brethren"—JOHN BJORLIE

This seminar will point out those distinctive teachings and activities that bear the impress of God's approval in the so-called "brethren movement." Aware that church history did not began in the 1830s, we will steer clear of parochial interests, to show how the awakening of the 1800s was influenced by the church at large, and how that awakening affected the church. This generation should know the saints God raised up at this crisis in history.

JOHN contributes regularly to Uplook and assists in graphics and editing at Gospel Folio Press. Commended in 1984, he is involved in open-air preaching on college campuses. He and his

23. Can We Expect a Pretrib Rapture?—DR. JAMES T. NAISMITH

The Lord promised to return to take His people Home. Differentiation must be made between the "Rapture" and the "Revelation." Subjects to be considered: the time of the Rapture and who are included; the relationship of the Rapture to the Tribulation; and how the Rapture should affect our lives. The position will be Pre-Tribulational, but consideration will be given to other views.

JAMES was born in India of missionary parents, educated in Scotland, and graduated in medicine (Glasgow). He came to Canada in 1959, practicing medicine through 1983. He then was commended to the Lord's work. His ministry includes teaching

Eschatology at Kawartha Lakes Bible College.

24. Creation/Evolution—Don Graham

Recent books by prominent professionals challenge Darwinism and philosophical naturalism. Why is this important to believers? Discuss: Why is belief in a Creator crucial to Christianity?

What evidence is there for an Intelligent Designer? Can a creation-19 ist be accepted in the scientific community? What are some of the key facts and experiments that challenge evolution? What resources exist if you want to dig deeper?

DON is an elder and teacher from Martin Road Gospel Chapel in metro Detroit. He holds BS and MS degrees in physics and metallurgy. The holder of several patents, he has authored numerous scientific papers. He and his wife, Barb, have 5 children. (YTS)

25. Contending for the Faith in a Hostile World —DR. JOHN LENNOX

In the media, courts and government, and in the halls of academia, Christians are ridiculed for their beliefs. How can a Christian face this attack? Is the gospel really intellectually defensible? This three-part seminar will deal with these issues: Is Naturalism, the prevailing world view, logically defensible? The problem of pain and suffering; Do all religions lead to God?

JOHN is a Professor of Mathematics at the University of Cardiff, Wales, and a lifelong student of the Word. He has defended the faith before academics in the UK, the US, Russia, and Eastern Europe. With Dr. Gooding, he publishes as biweekly column in the Russian newspaper, Uchitelskaya Gazeta (The Teachers' Gazette),

contending for the Christian faith.

26. The Christian Answer to Pagan Philosophies, Ancient & Modern

—Dr. David Gooding

We are facing the same pagan influences that 1st century Christians combatted. The New Testament has already answered your Gnostic, Stoic, and Epicurean friends. This study will help us understand how non-Christians think. It also should impact our gospel presentation. This is a three-part seminar.

DAVID is professor emeritus of Old Testament Greek at Queen's University, Belfast, and a Member of the Royal Irish Academy. He travels extensively in a Bible teaching ministry and, besides academic works, is the author of helpful expository books

on John 13-17, Acts, Hebrews, and Luke.

ELDER/WORKER

27. Principles & Procedures of Church Discipline—HERMAN LUHM

While often unpleasant, discipline is necessary for a healthy and fruitful assembly. Church discipline, like every other facet of assembly life, is outlined for us in the Bible. With God's direction and the Holy Spirit's control, this ministry can be singularly blessed by God. Church discipline can bear "the peaceable fruit of righteousness" (Heb. 12:11). When and how this process takes place will be the theme of our studies.

HERMAN was born and raised in San Diego, CA. He trusted the Saviour while attending an assembly there, and was later commended to the Lord's work by that assembly. He has served the

Lord (chiefly in WV) for more than 50 years.

28. Shepherds Wanted for the Work of God!—Dr. Peter Aceti

We need qualified, committed shepherds to get to work! Leaving this responsibility unfulfilled, or done half-heartedly is a loss for you and your assembly. Needed: men of conviction, empowered by the Spirit; shepherds who live model lives and stand firm on God's Word. Look at the requirements, characteristics, and work of an elder. Keeping all our responsibilities in balance is demanding, but with the Lord's help, it can be done.

Peter is a Doctor of Optometry in general practice in Sault Ste. Marie, ON, where he is an elder in Queen Street Bible Chapel. His ministries include shepherding and preaching the Word. He and

his wife, Marilyn, have two children.

29. Helping the Poor in North America—RICH BISHOP

The Lord Jesus came to preach the gospel to the poor. Many of our grandparents were poor. Once saved, however, they became careful with money, and they and their children moved up in the world. Has our assembly lost touch with the poor? How can we make contact? The pros and cons to practical aid to the poor.

RICH and his wife, Betty, make their home in Clifton, CO, where they are involved in assembly life. A teacher by profession, Rich has an upholstery (tentmaking) business which the Lord has used as a means of reaching into the community.

30. The Changing Face of World Missions—PATRICK LONG

Travel, communications, education, length of stay on the field—all have changed significantly over the past forty years. Are all of these changes for the better? Or has something important been left out of the equation? Examine these, and other key topics.

PATRICK was born in Angola, the son of missionaries. A graduate of Mining Engineering and a former school teacher, he and his wife, Gael, served in Colombia for seven years. He now is involved with Emmaus Correspondence courses, Everyday Publications, and MSC. Active in an itinerant ministry, he has been an instructor at the CMML/MSC Missionary Orientation Program.

31. How to Start and Carry On a Prison Ministry—GERRIT BLOK

Our needy Samaria includes our prisons, which contain the outcasts of our society. Prison ministry may not be for everyone, but it is an excellent assembly outreach. At present, there are 32 assembly-based prison ministries in North America. Learn how you or your assembly can become involved in this vital work.

GERRIT and Susan, from London, ON, became involved in prison ministry in 1980, while Gerrit was a teacher. In 1987, the ministry necessitated their full attention. They were commended at that time to New Life Prison Ministry on a full-time basis.

32. Be More Effective in Your Sunday School Work—ANN REESE

Look at ways to maximize the effectiveness of your Sunday School class. We will be addressing such topics as teacher preparation, knowing your students, behavior problems, discouragement, teaching ideas, and resources available. (WOS)

ANN REESE and her husband, Joe, reside in Sault Ste. Marie, ON. They were commended by several assemblies in Ontario in 1983. As well as her role of wife and mother, she currently teaches Sunday School in their home assembly.

33. How to Reach the Unreached Children—Debbie AULD

The best way is just do it! But few people seem to have an exercise to reach children not exposed to the gospel. Backyard clubs, school clubs, DVBS, Sunday School—the possibilities are endless. Gather some ideas, including materials, methods, and motivation. Explaining laws concerning public schools will dispel the lie that it is illegal to evangelize this mission field. (WOS)

Debbie, from Ashtabula, OH, was saved at the age of 11 in a Vacation Bible School. An RN, she left employment after being commended with her husband to pursue an extensive Bible Club work in the elementary schools in Ohio, as well as in her home.

34. Creative Ways to Evangelize at Special Events—Dave Stiefler

There are many ways to evangelize on special days or occasions—such as Mother's Day, Easter, Memorial Day, and the Christmas season. We will offer samples of tracts that are rarely refused, and encourage you in giving out the Word of God.

DAVID was commended to full time service in 1959 by Blasdell Gospel Chapel, NY. About 18 weeks of each year he conducts Family Week series, using blacklit visuals. Summers are spent in camp work. The rest of the year, he ministers in the home area.

35. Ministering to Urban America—KEN HAMPTON

How can we minister effectively in the inner-city? Is a crosscultural ministry for everyone? Many of God's choicest cross-cultural servants were not of the same race of their converts. But there are problems. Most of these challenges are a result of fear, ignorance, or falsehoods spread by the media. Also the historical prospective: racism, education, employment, and economics.

KEN, a former police officer, now directs the Grace Chapel community Youth Center in Detroit, MI. He is an elder of Grace Chapel and has a deep burden for the needs of inner city youth. He and his wife, Ellen, were commended in 1985.

36. Relief & Practical Work on the Mission Field—PANEL

We ought to C.A.R.E. for our brothers and sisters in need. This panel of men, who have been involved in helping during disaster or poverty relief, will discuss: Communicating the need; Accountability of finances; Responsibility for resources; and Effective testimony of workers. Objectives and blessings in practical relief.

SAM CAIRNS, moderator, has served for many years as an assembly elder. He was involved in retail and wholesale management positions until he and his wife, Beth, recently moved to Uplook Ministries. He oversaw major assembly relief work following the 1979 hurricane disaster on St. Lucia/Dominica, West Indies.

JOHN BJORLIE

arold St. John (1876-1957) preferred to have his name pronounced sin-jun, feeling that the title of "saint" was too superior of a meeting, sounding. But if anyone wanted an example of saintliness, they could have pointed in Harold St. John's direction.

His father had a government position as the John, I would treasurer of Sarawak, a state in Malaysia. Later give the world his family would also spend time in Germany and Belgium. After his mother, Blanche, became a believer, she quickly applied the principles of Bible as you Christian child rearing to her home. By God's grace, Harold and his five siblings came to know and love the Lord Jesus. In their stays in England, the St. John family had Bible teachers such as W. J. Lowe around the tea table, and Harold recounts paying visits to old veterans like Charles H. Mackintosh.

Harold was eighteen when he definitely came to know Christ.

I remember the day—I shall never forget it, when I saw my Saviour with the giant's head in His hand, unchallengeable proof that the work of salvation was eternally finished, for He had destroyed him that had the power of death, and, through fear of death, had imprisoned those who all their lifetime were subject to bondage. And since that day, when I knew my Saviour had destroyed the giant and broken his power forever, and carried the witness of His victory up to the City of God-since that day, I have never known the slightest challenge or fear in my heart as to my eternal security in the Lord Jesus Christ...He has triumphed, He has gone up to God, and by His mercy I am going there, too.

About this time, he secured a position at a London bank. His normal workday lasted nine hours, after which he would catch a quick tea and march off to a preaching appointment. Vacation time was given to helping Lord Radstock in his evangelistic work on the continent. To mix in with the highbrow element would have been natural for this oh-so-proper Englishman. But he had already set his course, and his brush with

aristocrisy did not turn his head. Percy Rouff worked at the bank, too, and said that he never saw him dawdle, on the street or in life. Together they would descend to places like "The Mile End Waste" to preach in the open air. Ada Habershon also did personal evangelism among the street people of London and Harold helped. He was willing to do this kind of work, but it did not come naturally to the upscale bank employee.

Many nights he preached in the open air, or in flop houses, but was disturbed by the way his less fortunate audience took to his message:

When I was quite young I used to go down to the slums of London. I would go into a common lodging house on a Sunday night dressed in a frock coat and a silk top hat and I would stand there with a Testament in my hand and preach and preach, and be very much surprised that the people did not listen to me. I was enormously impressed at their iniquity! Here was a young man in a frock coat and a silk top hat, and they didn't even listen to him! Then I discovered the reason why they would not listen. I got hold of the oldest suit I could borrow and in the pocket of that suit I placed the sum of four pence. In the evening I went, with the ragtag and bobtail of the district, to that lodging house where two or three hundred men were to sleep for the night.

I sat where they sat, and the fleas that bit them bit me; the same crawly things that crawled on them crawled on me. I spent some nights in that dreadful chamber silently listening to their needs and woes. Then at six o'clock one morning, when they were getting their breakfast, I arose and began to speak to them. Now I found there was not the slightest difficulty in obtaining their attention. I understood how the seas of life were buffeting them, and they were perfectly willing to listen to a man who had sat where they sat.

The greatest day in our history was the day when it came to the heart of God to draw closer to us than He had ever done before, after forty centuries of dwelling in cloud and thick darkness. But He did not send His Son

to start preaching some code: when our Lord went into the business of Redemption, for thirty years He never said a word of public ministry. For thirty years He sat where men sat and listened to their thoughts and experiences. For thirty years He knew hunger, weariness, poverty, and the cares of that little home. Then He began to speak. And the world has been listening ever since.

The Lord Himself had become his objective, and thereafter a mediocre Christian experience could not be tolerated. He complained about delivering "a dispiriting lecture to a handful of resigned looking people. London is a freezing place spiritually." But in that chill atmosphere Harold overcame. The intensity of his early Christian life shows in his diary entries.

"Jan. 8. Hall full and prayer meeting after. Is revival beginning? O God, give me purpose in prayer. Guard my lips from folly and open them for testimony.

"Jan. 15. Hall full, but, oh for power! True teaching and natural freedom useless. Why is it withheld? More prayer and obedience to the will of God. A watch tells time if in harmony with the universe.

"Jan 29. Hall well filled. By grace some power, but it is not revival. Oh, let it come; my heart breaks for it. I haven't begun to live the Christian life. I need ways directed by the Word and sympathies in harmony with the mind of Christ.

"Feb. 24. Spent all night in prayer with M.G. Preaching next day, voice failed and spirit, too. Wonderful stories of revival in Wales. Why not here?"

In April of 1905, Harold enjoyed a taste of that longed for revival in a fishing village of St. Ives in Cornwall. He had taken his Easter vacation to hold gospel meetings with his older brother Arthur when the blessing fell.

"11th. Crowds at first meeting. Fifty more came in at 9:30. Five cases of conviction. Left the hall at 11:00. I sorely need wisdom to direct.

"13th. Five to ten cases of conviction. I spoke on 1 Corinthians 14:34. Rowdyism in the meeting. Stayed till midnight with backsliders. Two young men confessed grandly. One dropped down on the floor crying,

'If that's the gospel, I accept Christ.'

"14th. T.C. broke down and came out well for Christ. A fine brother's meeting re converts. Several more till midnight. Beginning of real opposition.

"Wed. Reaping day. Nine cases of conversion. One said, 'I needn't go upstairs; I received Christ here.'

"Thur. Landlord of the Inn closed his pub, saying, 'I can't serve God in this business.'

"Fri. Huge overflow; many turned away."

At the close of those meetings three hundred people came out to see the St. John brothers off on the train. Decades later, they still spoke of that season of blessing. Can we attribute these results to natural talents? Percy Rouff said, "St. John, with his powerful voice and fluent tongue, drew and held the crowds with his graphic word pictures and his youthful, ruddy appearance. Either alone or with one other, he would go to Hyde Park and preach to the crowds." Yes, there was natural ability. But we judge by the fruit that there was an immense hidden root system in his life that drew on God's supernatural powers.

Once St. John stood in the private chapel of Keble College, Oxford, viewing a copy of Holman Hunt's masterpiece, *The Light of the World*, when some tourists sauntered by. The guide intoned, "The original of this picture was sold for £5000." Before the words had died on the air, St. John's own voice announced: "Ladies and gentleman, may I add that the true original of this picture was sold for thirty pieces of silver." Only silence followed Harold's words. The stunned tourists lingered long enough to let this message penetrate, and, with new reverence, filed out of the chapel.

In 1913, he astounded his superiors by resigning

from the bank in order to pursue missionary work. His manager asked, "How will you live, and who will provide for your expenses, since you are not going out under any recognized missionary society?"

Harold answered, "I'm going out to do God's work. God is sending me, and God will provide."

"Well, St. John, I wish I had your faith."

In July of 1914, he married an equally devoted Christian, Ella Swain, and that fall they sailed to Buenos Aires, Brazil. Harold's experiences among the slum dwellers was good training. Their home there was infested with beetles and other creeping things that would immerge from the cracks and crevices at night. The legs of their camp beds stood in pans of kerosene to deter the ones that could not fly. There Ella learned to share a kitchen with four other families. Such were the St. John's romantic missionary beginnings.

When expecting their first child, Ella received news that her father was gravely ill back in England. They elected to have Ella sail to England, to be with her father and wait to deliver her first child. This disruption to their family life was worsened when Ella and baby Hazel could not return to Brazil because of World War I. Harold and Ella accepted these awkward and difficult situations as a part of God's will in their lives. The love and spiritual reality that reigned in the St. John home by all accounts was true.

Harold had linked up with Homer Payne and gone on extended missionary trips into Bolivia, Paraguay, Uruguay, and Argentina, often by horseback and on foot. Then in 1917, he and Stuart McNair began a more localized teaching ministry in Carangola, with a Bible School, stating, "Our chief desire is that there may be an atmosphere of prayer and spiritual power, in order that, while progressing in study, there may be still more progress in the knowledge of God."

In 1921, he left Brazil for a trip to British Guiana, and to pursue an expansive itinerant ministry. From there he extended his ministerial confines beyond South America to the Northern Hemisphere, the West Indies, Europe, North and South Africa, Palestine, Australia, and New Zealand. He co-labored with many honored servants of Christ, including E. H. Broadbent, Harold P. Barker, C. F. Hogg and W. W. Fereday.

Fred Mitchell, the home director of the China Inland Mission, was a dear friend who said that St. John

"knew his Bible better than anyone else in Britain." His extensive studies in God's Word have recently been made available by Gospel Tract Publishers of Glasgow in 2 large volumes (available from Uplook Ministries). Reading them, we can see why F. F. Bruce referred to St. John as "The Maestro" and said: "For detailed acquaintance with the text of Scripture he had few equals."

Evangelist Eric Hutchings wrote: "Mr. Harold St. John has been one of the greatest spiritual influences of my life. It was he above all others who inspired me to get down to a detailed study of the Bible, to seek the plain and obvious meanings of the words, rather than to attempt to see typical meanings, sometimes abstruse and remote, in everything. By this sane, prayerful approach, the true typical teaching of Scripture emerged. In other words, he taught me that it was necessary to go to the Scripture first and let the Word of God unfold itself, rather than to get hold of some dispensational or typical outline and force the interpretation of such a meaning. He stayed with us in Manchester many times during the years 1935-1945, and even when he was not staying with us, we would lunch together once or twice a week to discuss the things of God. My last meeting with him was typical...It was the last time I saw him...his face radiant with the glory of God."

This word "radiant" was used repeatedly to describe the currents of joy that friends saw in him. There was a luminous quality about his face. He was tall, his hair had turned a clean white, and a rosy shine seemed to come from beneath the skin of his face. A man who enjoyed a long walk to his preaching appointments, he would stride along, his lips moving in what he called "perambulatory prayer," arms swinging, oblivious to passersby. Once in the pulpit, he stood before the saints and, without looking at his Bible, would recite from memory the passage to be studied.

His final year was spent in Abergele, North Wales, where Ella's sister was headmistress of a girls' school. Brother St. John's closing Bible teaching was to the pupils. Nearby in Malvern was the Gospel Hall where the family met with the believers and where he had baptized all of his five children.

In a letter to Ella he wrote, "Take plenty of time for peace and quiet, and keep a good wide margin for giving thanks for the children. We have been so terribly happy in all five—and in the three daughters-in-law. You met me at the foot of the hill, and I am nearly at the top, but oh! what a lovely climb it has been, and what a world of wealth and music they have brought us—and what a joy that we are all, without exception, one in Christ Jesus."

To the end, Harold St. John kept himself in the sunshine. From his deathbed he said, "I am too weak to pray, I am too tired to love Him much, but I'm just lying here, letting Him love me." In and out of consciousness, he would murmur, "When I go in to see the King it will be very bright...the King in His

beauty...pure, cloudless joy...it's all gone, all my sins, all my fears...only Christ now...I'm the happiest man alive...It's all bright, all bright!"

Lifting Sixteen Years of Heavy Baggage

I was standing by the side of the road not long ago, with two heavy bags. There were no buses and I was about a mile-and-a-half from the conference which I wished to attend, so I asked the Lord about the matter and told Him my position.

Just as I was telling Him, a man drew up and said, "Excuse me, can you tell me where such and such a place is?"

I said, "It's three miles up the road."

He looked at me and said, "Can I give you a lift?"

"Thank you," I replied. After I'd been in the car a few minutes, I said, "Do you know what I thought of as I got into this car? It's a word in the old Book that says, 'Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ.' Do you know anything about that?"

He stopped the car, swung round on me. and said almost fiercely, "Why do you say that word out of the Bible to me? The last time I was in church, sixteen years ago, the minister preached on that text, and I've never darkened the door of a church since."

"Well, what was wrong with that Scripture?"

"Oh," he said, "he read the beginning of some chapter, 'Bear ye one another's burdens,' and then he read almost in the next verse, 'Every man shall bear his own burden,' and I asked the clergyman what he meant by those verses, and he said he didn't know."

"Very well," I said, "we will look it up for one moment. For there are two words for burdens. The first, in the verse, 'Bear ye one another's burdens,' means a load under which a man is staggering. It is a simple exhortation to kindness, to do as Christ did. In the next verse, the word 'burden' is a nautical word, the word sailors use; it's used of the cargo of a ship. Now a ship's captain never wants anyone else to carry his cargo, for he would lose all his profit. And that means that everyone must carry his own burden of responsibility."

"Is that really right?" he said.

"Yes," I answered, "and doesn't that look as though the Book is not so stupid as you thought? Now you just drive up to that place where I'm going, and we'll sit down in a quiet corner. We'll go over those sixteen wasted years; then I'll tell you what the Lord Jesus has done for me, and what He can do for you."


So there we sat for nearly an hour in a side road, and I preached to him Jesus.

I gave you that illustration to show you that you meet the strangest, most out-of-the-way people, and thousands of them are ready, if we will only preach to them of the wisdom of Christ. It is extraordinary to see how grateful people are that someone takes an interest in a stranger's soul. Let the redeemed of the Lord say so, for the sake of the people around who are dying without Christ. We know the way out of the wilderness, and they don't; we have the key to the dungeon, and they haven't; so for our own sakes, for their sakes, and for His sake, let us say so."

Raising Families in the West is Tough

IS IT?



Afghanistan: Non-Muslims are denied freedom of assembly, and open profession among refugees has often led to deaths. Islamic radicals rule the country.

Azerbaijan: Although Azerbaijan officially guarantees religious freedom for all, the nationalists are becoming more Islamic and anti-Christian.

Bangladesh: One of the poorest nations on earth, Bangladesh suffers from overpopulation, flooding, and cyclones. Believers are often denied access to public water wells by Muslim extremists.

Bhutan: Buddhism is the state religion. All public worship, evangelism, and proselytism is illegal.

Brunei: Constitutional guarantees for religion are eroding; no evangelism is allowed among Muslims. Only Islam is taught in the schools. The government routinely bans religious teaching materials and Bibles.

China: With its high population, China experiences more persecution than any other country. Even so, an estimated 3,000 Chinese come to Christ each day! China's new "Strike Hard" policy has brought increased pressure against Christians; Bibles are regularly confiscated and believers jailed or beaten.

Comoro Islands: All open witness is forbidden in this Islamic state. Less than 1% of the population knows Christ, and any meeting openly are persecuted.

Cuba: Although some material help and Bibles are being carried in by Christians from the West, this last bastion of Communism in the Western Hemisphere is hard on believers. Some are imprisoned; most are suffering privation; all are restricted in their witness.

Iran: Shi'a Islam is the state religion. The press is censored. Ministry among Muslims is prohibited, and spies are infiltrated into Christian groups.

Laos: Evangelism is strictly prohibited, and it is illegal to bring in foreign literature. Christian leaders are jailed for their faith.

Libya: No form of witness is allowed from Christians, who compose less than 3% of the population.

Of course it isn't easy to raise children in a pagan society. But if we only compare our country to the way it was 40 years ago, we miss the true picture. Compare it to Turkey or Sudan!

Information from Voice of the Martyrs 1997 special issue

Maldives: All citizens are required to be Muslims. No Christian places of worship are allowed, and open witness can result in severe punishment.

Mauritania: Only Sunni Muslims can be citizens. The only Christian church service allowed is restricted to foreign Christians. The constitutional guarantees of religious freedom do not extend to Christians.

Oman: Only foreigners are allowed to legally practice Christianity. There is only one indigenous group known to exist, with about 20 believers.

Pakistan: The government is attempting to "Islamize" all public life in this country. There is a blasphemy law here that calls for life imprisonment for any who insult the prophet Mohammed.

Qatar: Qatari Christians have suffered much for their faith. Witness to Muslims is forbidden and only foreign Christians are allowed to meet.

Saudi Arabia: When Islam gained control in the land of Mecca 1,300 years ago, all Christians were expelled. Things are not much brighter today. Even expatriate Christians are not allowed to meet. Anyone evangelizing faces jail time, expulsion, or even execution.

Sudan: The Christians here are facing unparalleled persecution: entire villages are slaughtered; children are sold into slavery; hundreds of Christians a day are perishing at the hands of Muslim extremists.

Space does not allow us to tell of Algeria, Cyprus, Egypt, Equatorial Guinea, Indonesia, Iraq, Kuwait, Morocco, Myanmar, Nigeria, Somalia, Sri Lanka, Syria, Tajikistan, Tibet, Tunisia, Turkey, United Arab Emirates, Viet Nam, Uzbekistan, or the believers who raise their families in animistic societies. Oh, God! Keep us from our whining complaints. Help us to appreciate that we can live "quiet and peaceable" lives in these lands (1 Tim. 2:2). Help us to pray more earnestly for our "brethren in bonds." Show us how to buy up the opportunities we have on every hand!

Five Widows

JAMES FORD

t is the privilege of some of us who are serving the Lord overseas to have praying for us some faithful elderly sisters, who give themselves unstintingly to the ministry of intercession. This ministry may be hidden from men, but it must be very precious in the sight of God, and there is no doubt that we, as the Lord's servants, benefit greatly thereby, in ways known and unknown.

This is no new thing. There are many records in the Holy Scriptures of the devotion to the Lord of honorable women, and I was recently impressed by the fact that in Luke's Gospel alone there are no less than five widows specifically referred to. Their characters and circumstances vary tremendously. In fact, one can say that perhaps the only thing they have in common is that they were in fact widows, yet each one of them has, I believe, a very definite message for us.

Four of these were real living persons, and the one of chapter 18, although a parabolic character, may well have also been a living personage whom the omniscient Christ used as the subject of His story. Let us

consider these five widows individually and seek to deduce the varied, yet united testimony which they bear to help us in our Christian walk and service.

THE GODLY WIDOW (Lk. 2:36-38)

Anna had probably been a widow 84 years; married 7 years; if, therefore, she were in the region of twenty years of age at marriage she was approximately 111 years old when her long life of worship, consisting of day and night fast-

ings and supplications, was crowned by the wondrous sight of the Promised Messiah, then but a babe in arms. In this gracious woman the words of Psalm 84 were exemplified: "How amiable are Thy tabernacles, O Lord of Hosts! My soul longeth, yea, even fainteth for the courts of the Lord...Blessed are they that dwell in Thy house: they will still be praising Thee."

This saintly widow, we are told, departed not from the temple. To her it was divinely revealed that this child was none other than the Lord's Anointed. She spoke of Him to all that were looking for the redemption of Israel. From this first widow we see clearly that consecration of life results in certainty of testimony.

THE GENTILE WIDOW (Lk. 4:25-26)

The Saviour used this Sidonian widow as a unique illustration of the truth that a prophet is unacceptable in his own country. In the days of Elijah there were many widows in Israel, but to this Gentile woman the prophet was sent in an hour of desperate famine. Space forbids our going into all the details of God's amazing provision for His servant in the humble home of this poor widow, and of the blessing which she herself received in consequence. Suffice it to say that I believe the Lord referred to her in that synagogue at Nazareth to show us all that if we refuse to accept into our hearts and homes the gracious ministry and person of Jesus Christ, then this great benediction will go to others. There is a special word here for any in Christian homes who may read this magazine and are as yet themselves unsaved. Grasp now your opportunity of salvation by trusting the Saviour before it is too late.

There is, of course, a second lesson which lies right on the surface, and it is this—in providing for the Lord's servants, your barrel of meal will never empty nor your cruse of oil fail.



THE SORROWING WIDOW (Lk. 7:11-17)

Have you ever pictured in your mind that tremendous scene at Nain so long ago? Here we have two throngs of people, moving in opposite directions, and following different persons. Drawing near to the city is a great crowd following the life-giving Son. Coming out of the city is a second crowd following a lifeless son.

When these two opposing throngs meet, something is bound to happen. Someone must triumph. The issue is never in doubt. "Young man, I say unto thee, Arise."

"He that was dead sat up and began to speak, and He gave him to his mother." The widow's sorrow was turned into joy, and she reminds us that in the person of Christ, death, our greatest enemy, has met its Master.

THE PERSISTENT WIDOW (Lk. 18:1-8)

We do well, when our prayer life is flagging, to get back to this amazing parable. Here was this widow unwelcome, unwanted, calling for justice, coming to a man in authority who was unjust, unmerciful, and selfish to the last degree. Despite all these discouragements she got what she wanted, simply because she wanted it badly enough to keep on when the cause seemed lost. What a contrast to our privilege as children of God! We are invited to come; we have an Advocate before the throne; we have the all-prevailing Name in which to make request, we are promised the ear of a righteous God, who is also our Father and who

loves His children. Shame on us, then, if we do not pray. Brother, sister, remember this widow. Pray always, and faint not.

THE POOR WIDOW (Lk. 21:1-4)


I always feel that the most significant thing about this dear woman's giving was this—she had two mites and she gave them both. Had she given only one she was still exceeding by 40% her obligation to give 10%. But she gave all she had—100%. The all-seeing eye of the Son of God saw not only the size of the gift, but the size of her love and gratitude to God. Hers was indeed true worship.

The Gospel record does not follow her footsteps, penniless footsteps back home from the temple, but we may be assured of one thing—that poor widow did not die of starvation! Her message to us simply cannot be mistaken: give as unto the Lord, and not as unto men. Someone has said, "Christianity affects us in three stages—first, our heads; second, our hearts; third, our pockets; but between the second and third stages there are cataracts broader than those which block the Nile."

In conclusion, let us hear again the message of the five widows:

- 1. Live a consecrated life.
- 2. Receive the grace of God.
- 3. Triumph in Christ.
- 4. Pray without ceasing.
- 5. Give sacrificially and joyfully.

Refuse old wives' fables, but follow the wisdom of these widows!



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Three Cheers for the Sunday School!

hatever the social changes that have taken place over the years and their damage to the Sunday School, none can overcome the power of the gospel to reach boys and girls. It is true that we need not cling to an outdated program just for tradition's sake. But there is reason to believe God can do a mighty work again in the Sunday School. Here are some suggestions of ways to improve the Sunday School.

1. We need to think of the Sunday School in terms of a work for God rather than a program to manage. In discussing Sunday School work of the past with older Christians, I discovered that what made the Sunday School was work done by dedicated teachers who loved children. Too often the Sunday School is a program we operate: a certain number of classes are arranged; a corresponding number of teachers must be found, and a last-minute plea is made to fill the ranks. Curriculum is ordered and programs planned. While a certain amount of order is needed to work together, the real vision of Sunday School is reaching boys and girls with the gospel. Years ago, teachers were prayer warriors, Bible students, home visitors, chauffeurs, and Sunday School picnic enthusiasts. This is what made Sunday School alive and the kids knew it.

2. We need to remember children are lost. I suppose it is pretty much official—we live in a godless, pagan society. The dysfunctional family is everywhere. We are easily moved by their poor home environment. But these are mere symptoms of the power of darkness. It was a hopeless, pagan society that the early apostles turned upside down. Children are perishing. The Sunday School can reach them.

3. We need to use Sunday School as a training ground for young believers. This takes work. It is not a matter of just throwing them into responsibility and seeing how they do. Under the watchful eye of interested elders and the superintendent, young people can learn responsibility, Bible study, dealing with people, problems, discouragement, and blessing. Here is one place where future workers are developed. Many elders, preachers, missionaries, deacons, and hard

working saints got their start in Sunday School.

4. We need to immerse the Sunday School in prayer. Think about keeping information before the assembly. Keep it specific and interesting. Provide lists of teachers to be prayed for. Spreading missionary news goes back to New Testament days. It was a good idea then; it is a good idea today. Keep praying those kids into the kingdom.

5 We need good curriculum. The temptation is too great not to mention Modular Bible Lessons from Gospel Folio Press. Modular Bible Lessons are based on a proven strategy in building spiritual truth the way the Bible does. Many curriculums today are designed for the widest possible church market-big on artwork and light on content. There is a subtle message of salvation by good works in many products. Teaching little Mary to be obedient to Mommy or not to be afraid of the dark is pointless if we haven't first taught Mary about her need of a Saviour to overcome her disobedience and be her Friend in the dark. Check out your curriculum. Does it demand Bible study on the part of teachers, or has it done all the work requiring only ten minutes on a Saturday night? No wonder kids get bored in Sunday School. If teachers aren't moved by the message, don't expect the kids to be.

6. We need to love the kids. You can't beat love. It gets everyone's attention. It beats TV, videos, and computer games. Children respond to genuine attention and affection. It is the means whereby the gospel gets an audience.

7. We need to keep the singing bright and Bible-based. Kids will sing if there is something to sing about. There are lots of good choruses and gospel songs with a message and a melody. Throw out the stuff that doesn't line up with the Book and get those kids singing.

The Lord Himself spent time with children. The disciples turned children away in the middle of an adult conversation, but the Saviour was willing to be interrupted to take them up in His arms, and bless them (Mk. 10:16).

Three cheers for the Sunday School...for of such is the kingdom of heaven.

he answer seems obvious. Of course the family is important! Our western civilization is collapsing for this very reason: people have lost sight of the importance of the family. Leisure activities, career advancement, financial security, just about anything comes be- It's important fore family today. The family is the building to get a little block of society, and when the family crumbles, the society is doomed.

In all fairness, however, we must ask another question: Why does the New Testament have so on issues now little to say in directly addressing the family? Are there a few dozen verses? Apart from Ephesians 5:22-6:4 and Colossians 3:18-21, there are a few scattered references in 1 Timothy 4 and 5 and Titus 1 regarding elders and deacons, 2 Timothy 3:14-15 regarding Timothy's personal life, and Peter's exhortation in 1 Peter 3:1-7.

When the Lord discussed family issues, He Word of God. repeatedly called us to recognize a higher claim

on our loyalty: "If any man come to Me, and hate not his father, and mother, and wife, and children, and brethren, and sisters, yea, and his own life also, he cannot be My disciple" (Lk. 14:26; see also Mt. 19:29). Did He mean that?


We can draw inferences from His blessing little children, attending a marriage in Cana, and reuniting family

members who had been severed by death. Did Christ think the family was important? Of course! He designed it. Why, then, is there so little about the family in the New Testament? And why so much about the church? Is He telling us something?

Some Christians are putting all their energies into the family at the expense of the church. Others are prepared to leave their assembly to find a large congregation where their children will have more activities. How often we hear the refrain: "My parents put the assembly first and we suffered for it. We're going to put the family first!"

But is it one or the other? Has the Lord forced us to choose one and lose the other? Did He give us two wonderful gifts-our family and His fam-

It's easy to overreact to the carelessness of the pagan world regarding family by seeing our human family as the most important thing in life. It can become a kind of extended egotism. I can excuse my self-centered lifestyle by saying, "It's not for me, you understand. It's for my family."

Many of God's people, frantic because of the decay around them, are looking for some foolproof formula that will guarantee success with their children. Parents do have a solemn responsibility, but children have their own response. Remember that the best Father in the universe has had much heartache with wayward children!

One is hard pressed to find model families in the Bible. With few exceptions, the families featured in the Word of God would be labeled dysfunctional by society today. You know the stories. The first son in history commits patricide. Abraham, father of the faithful, takes an Egyp-

tian slave girl to bear him an heir, then disposes of her in the desert. Isaac's family, rife with favoritism, is torn apart at the seams. Jacob's boys hate their young sibling, Joseph, and plot first to kill him, then to sell him into slavery in Egypt.

The sordid tale continues. Eli has scoundrels for sons. And what of Samuel's sons? Or David's? Or


Solomon's? New Testament families fare little better. Our Lord's own half-brothers, reared by godly Joseph and Mary, mocked His claims.

There are bright exceptions. Othniel and Achsah. Ruth and Boaz. Loyal Jonathan. Resolute Abigail. Timothy's mother and grandmother (where were the men?). Aquila and Priscilla; Andronicus and Junia; Rufus and his mother.

Such a review teaches us to be vigilant for our families, to seek to be a bright exception to the rule. Of course, our families are important! But never forget that earthly relationships will no longer function as such in Heaven's country. The best thing you can do for your family now is to set their sights on eternal things and invest your lives together in God's Forever Family.



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
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A Prayer for the Household Robert Louis Stevenson
